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





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The Last Local Journalist

Robin Kemp created the *Clayton Crescent* to make the powerful accountable.

ROBIN KEMP slumped in a chair at the Fig Tree Café on a rainy afternoon, an untouched latte getting cool on the table.

"I'm overworked and I'm tired," she said. "I don't take the time to shower sometimes. I've got to learn to pace myself."

As the reporter/editor/photographer/videographer/video editor/web master/fundraiser for the three-year old digital newspaper, Kemp is committed to covering the "news desert" that she calls Clayton County, where six cities exist within a sizeable unincorporated area governed by a county commission that heads a large number of agencies whose policies affect citizens on a daily basis.

Many news deserts have swept into being across the country as print newspapers, especially in small communities, have shrunk or gone out of business. News deserts get little attention from the larger news organizations, such as the Atlanta Journal-Constitution and Atlanta TV stations, and rarely have more than one reporter covering the local angles.

"Corporate raiders come in and strip out the assets and lay off the newsroom. It becomes a zombie paper," she said of the struggling small community newspapers. "No matter what the medium is, there is always going to be a need for people who get the unvarnished truth down for the record."

Kemp bemoans the death of these local newspapers but flatly refuses for her publication to be called "the future of local journalism." She believes there may be a more sinister future for local news as the media giants continue to devour smaller publications and ignore local

"We are the present of local news," she said, pointing to her on-line newspaper as one of around 500 local newspapers in the nation-wide Institute for Non-Profit News. Yet, as the revenue streams dry up, she believes even these may be in danger of folding. She said that in Cuba, with its tightly restricted media, western news and programs not cleared by the state are passed around surreptitiously with a flash drive that is called "El Paquete."

"Honestly, looking at the political situation in the United States and the way things seem to be heading, I wouldn't be surprised if get El Paquetes here, and that is not a good thing."

Journalism is baked into her DNA. Her father, Jim Kemp, was a TV anchor in New Orleans, where Kemp was born on Mardi Gras. Rather than comic books, the young Kemp devoured the Columbia Journalism Review. Her father later joined CNN where he was senior assignment editor at the national desk.

In New Orleans, Kemp worked for the alternative weekly Gambit, covering everything from City Hall to historic preservation. In the first of her many honors, she was presented with the Brown Pelican award for covering coastal erosion in Louisiana. Little did she suspect that some three decades later the lessons learned from this experience would be put to use at her own digital newspaper.

She eventually wound up at CNN herself for nine years. While there she founded TurnOut, the LGBTQ group of Turner Broadcasting employees, that advocated for health benefits coverage for non-traditional partners. She was a producer of the in-house diversity training video called Through the Lens. After a short stint at the Weather Channel, where she created a system that would estimate power outages in storm areas, Kemp quit to pursue poetry.

After obtaining degrees in English and creative writing from Georgia State, and a Master of Fine Arts from the University of New Orleans, Kemp was named the "Best Poet in New Orleans," with poems printed in several magazines

and anthologies. She published a book of poetry, This Pagan Heaven.

But Kemp soon discovered that poetry pays even less than journalism. Her return to journalism came when the Clayton News Daily offered her the position of covering Clayton and Henry counties, by herself. The pandemic changed that.

When she was let go from the Clayton News Daily via phone call in April 2020, Kemp immediately went to her home office and began building the website that would become Claytoncrescent.org.

"What is lost is real coverage of what is happening in this community," she said of the traditional paper's decision to cut their reporting staff. "I didn't want that to happen. Clayton County is uniquely situated in the Atlanta metro area. It is a huge economic engine with all the warehouses and the airport."

Her first journalistic success came in the fall of 2020 that changed the way the city of Forest Park was holding its virtual Mayor and City Council meetings. Along with the First Amendment Clinic at the University of Georgia,

Kemp challenged the city's exclusion of her attending the meetings in person without providing adequate remote access as mandated by the state's sunshine laws. The city relented and improved its live streaming of its meetings.

Kemp and her little digital paper garnered huge national and international news with her coverage of the 2020 election results. Her curiosity had led her to cover the actual process of vot-

ing, which in her long career she had never done, in Clayton County. Her live Tweets about the election drew interest from many national news I didn't want that to happen. **Clayton County** she said. is uniquely

organizations as well as international "I went to lunch with a Norwegian crew and we had a really nice time," But as the day wore on, she found the ballot area was getting crazier and crazier. "There were platoons of

people who came in who had been issued statewide credentials. They were young people from one particular party. They seemed to be directed by some older people. One man said he had witnessed some ballot mingling. When I talked with him it was obvious that he didn't know what ballot mingling was."

The coverage blew up her donations over the next few days, a welcome relief after paying for everything "literally out of my back pocket." For her efforts, Kemp received the 2021 Media Changemaker Award from the Mercer University Center for Sustainable Journalism.

The mission of the Clayton Crescent is, according to Kemp, to cover issues of broad interest that will allow citizens to become participants in their local government's decision-making process rather than just being passive spectators. The way to do this, she said, is to cover the news from the average person's perspective, no matter what their political leanings or their economic status.

"I have Democrats who are mad at me. I have Republicans who are mad at me. I have Libertarians who are mad at me. I have Socialists who are mad at me. All of them are mad at me because I don't say what they want me to say," she said, sipping the last of her latte. "We are going to be as apolitical as possible." 💥

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Catching Up with K'La Inman, Social Media Influencer & Queen of Content

Upon meeting K'la Inman, I realized just how much I'd been oblivious to the world of social media influencers. It seemed like I'd been living in seclusion on Mars. Nevertheless, I was absolutely delighted to discover the invaluable insights and techniques K'La shared with me regarding the realm of social media influence.

"YOU ARE NOT PRETTY enough to become a model," are words Inman will never forget hearing her mother say. Those nine words have played a significant role in K'la Inman's journey. They have servedas a catalyst, enabling her to realize the transformative power of pain. At the age of 16, Inman held aspirations of becoming a model or actress. She dreamt of walking runways and gracing the big screen. Despite her mother's comment, K'la Inman has successfully broken into the entertainment industry, but NOT as a model or actor. She has gained significant recognition as a social media influencer by powering her pain into purposeful passion.



GETTING TO THE DREAM

Even though the memory of Inman's mother's comment about pursuing modeling was indelicate and harsh, Inman holds other memories, cherished ones, from her childhood. Particularly those memories from the trips she and her family took to the South.

Originally from Buffalo, New York, K'la, along with her siblings and parents, would travel to Alabama for family visits. "I remember those trips when I was a little girl. I always enjoyed going down south".

It was the unfortunate event of K'la's father being struck and tragically killed by a drunk driver, that compelled the family to permanently relocate to Birmingham.

Once she reached 18, her point of independence, K'la wasted no time in venturing out on her own. Remarkably, she'd already met her future husband at the age of 17, and they have remained inseparable ever since.

BUMPS IN THE ROAD

"In 2018, a significant turning point occurred in my life when my oldest daughter was selected as an extra in the movie, The Black Panther. Birmingham couldn't believe it," she reflects.

"During that period, we were suffering significant financial difficulties," she recalls. It would have been unimaginable for people to grasp the extent of the Inman family's struggle. She had to walk to McDonald's in order to access the internet and for a while the family ate oatmeal for breakfast, lunch and dinner.

Not only that, the Inman's experienced multiple car repossessions, so when one day, during her lunch break, K'la went outside to find the family car missing, she remained unfazed. Without flinching, she simply returned to the department store and had her lunch in the break room, choosing not to let the absence of the car affect her.

CREATING CONTENT THAT INFLUENCES

In an effort to keep the fire from the success of the Black Panther movie casting, aflame, Inman kicked into gear with an idea that would change the trajectory of her families fortune, hopefully, forever.

K'la credits her faith for her success, "It is only God that I am here. My husband and I knew that one day we would live in the house of our dreams, drive the cars and live in the neighborhood we desired so that our children would be afforded the opportunity to go to the best schools offered".

They stood on their faith and everyday K'la tried a new promotional idea. Then it happened, two people paid \$35 each for K'la Inman to teach them how to get their children into the entertainment industry. The rest is history.

When she came up with the idea she says, "I recall feeling fear-Irecall ful of others' opinions and the potential backlash". However, feeling she'd been in the same place for to long. "I decided to block anyfearful of one who[m] I anticipated would express negativity. I blocked others' them all." With this strategy in place, she began building her Facebook friends list opinions by requesting connections with friends of and the friends, steadily working towards reaching 5000 followers. Concurrently, K'la conpotential tinued promoting her classes. In 2020, K'la achieved her initial backlash. six-figure milestone by earning a six-figure income within a year.



Shortly thereafter, she surpassed her second six-figure objective by generating a six-figure income in a single month.

Originally, Inman had established her company with the intention of assisting individuals in learning the necessary steps to enter the entertainment industry. This endeavor stemmed from her own experience of not receiving the support she needed during her early ventures in the industry. Now, with her daughter's newfound fame, K'la found herself equipped with a sense of purpose, not only to aid other families but also to propel her own family towards financial success in the entertainment industry. 💥

South Atlanta Magazine had the privilege of engaging in an enlightening conversation with Dr. Spirit, delving deep into her commitment and gift of healing others. She emphasizes the importance of understanding and articulating one's feelings, enabling individuals to express themselves with clarity and purpose.

Through her work, Dr. Spirit is creating a transformative space where mental health is prioritized, discussed, and embraced within the Black community. Her mission to empower individuals to address their mental well-being is bringing hope and healing to countless lives. Join us as we embark on a journey of self-discovery and empowerment with Dr. Spirit, as she guides us towards a path of emotional wellness and resilience.

"Oftentimes we are very disconnected from our feelings and we do so as a function for survival. So when I ask people how are you feeling, they will say 'Oh I'm good, I'm fine' - good is not a feeling, fine is not a feeling. So I encourage them to answer more intentionally when I ask, 'What are you feeling and why are you feeling it?'"

Spirit also spoke of the stigmatization of mental wellness advocacy within the Black community and why the Black community should be more open to seeking psychiatric

help. "The socialization and the retelling of the Black experience has been revised, rewritten, and outright lied about," she said. "My responsibility is to bring awareness and to help connect the dots on why certain things happen and where they stem from."

SAM: What led you into becoming a professional in the mental health space? *Spirit*: I think this profession chose me, early on in life I never looked at being a therapist as a career. In ways my mother helped point it out to me as I was matriculating through college. The irony is when I told her I wanted to become a therapist, my mother said 'Of course, you have been doing this your whole life.'"

SAM: What advice and insight do you have for Black women who across all socioeconomic realms suffer from burnout?

Spirit: "There is a lack of balance amongst Black women where we try to do it all and make it look effortless. The challenging part is deciding what is most important and not overwhelming ourselves for taking on more than what we have capacity for.

Whether it be with our scheduling or spending, we are burning the candle on both ends, thrusting all of the things we need and want into a small space of time. The Black

superwoman syndrome is a very real thing, where we think we always have to be on go, all of the time, for all people. More times than not we are not showing up for ourselves in the ways that we need."

SAM: How would you address the stigma that Black men carry of not

wanting to seek therapy?

Spirit: There are several reasons why Black men are hesitant to seek therapy. Only 4% of mental health clinicians are Black and Black women outnumber Black male therapists 6:1. So when you talk about the absence of Black men in this space, I can connect with a Black male client via our melanin, but there are gender dynamics that a Black male client may feel more comfortable talking to another man about.

Black Men and Therapy

Black men have long been conditioned to be the pillars of society and civilization. Their identity often revolves around their manhood, making it uncomfortable for them to discuss vulnerability, heartbreak, or victimization. Seeking professional psychiatric help can be challenging, especially when it involves reaching out to someone who may not look like them or fully understand their perspective.

However, the conversation around mental health is evolving. The focus has shifted from pathology to awareness and self-care. People are embracing the importance of mental and emotional wellness, openly discussing their personal narratives, and breaking down the stigma associated with seeking help.

In the Black community, prioritizing mental health is not a sign of weakness but an act of strength. The rich history of social change within the community highlights the importance of taking care of one's mental well-being. Recognizing that mental health is crucial to overall health, more individuals are taking the necessary steps to achieve wholeness.

At the forefront of this mental health movement stands Dr. Spirit. With her unwavering commitment to the cause, she is empowering Black men to prioritize their mental well-being. Dr. Spirit understands the unique challenges faced by Black men and is leading the way in providing the support and guidance they need.

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The Wonder in a Little Girl's Eyes

Rhonda Burnough creates a museum celebrating African-American families and pioneers in Clayton County

t was the sparkling light that Rhonda Burnough saw in a young seven-year-old girl's eyes that sparked an idea to honor the African-American experience in Clayton County. The young girl, her step-granddaughter named McKenzie Palmer, had just seen Burnough's collection of African-American Santa dolls.

"That look in her eyes. I wanted to share that with others," she said. "That little girl's eyes told me that there are artifacts in many families that are significant."

The result is the R&M African-American Museum, a local museum dedicated to showcasing pioneering African-Americans such as elected officials, schoolteachers and administrators, and other trail blazing figures that have shaped the history of the county. The R in the museum name is for Rhonda and the M is

for Mary, her mother.

On a personal level, Burnough plans to display her extensive African-American doll collection that includes historical Barbie dolls of Rosa Parks, Alvin Alley, Maya Angelou, Kathryn Johnson, and the original African-American Barbie doll. One of the most interesting dolls is the first African-American Chatty Cathy, which Burnough collected alongside the Caucasian Chatty Cathy she had played with for years.

"The voice was the same in both dolls," she said.

Burnough is very particular when it comes to her doll collecting. She recently bought a Kamala Harris doll on the internet. But it was made with cheap plastic. "I sent it right back," she said.

Her One American Girl Doll Melody Ellison, listed on the American Girl website as an African-American singer in 1964 from Detroit, is to honor Burnough's hometown and the famous Hitsville of the Motown era.

Among the collection is a Birthday Barbie sporting a classic Afro, an African-American male and female Nutcracker, 20 miniature Hallmark African-American Barbies, an Olympic Gold Medalist Gabby Douglas doll wearing her signature Nike workout suit, and an African-American Marine. Beyond the 31 Barbie dolls and 45 regular dolls, doll houses, and a doll hospital, Burnough encourages family members to showcase their own African-American collections, whatever they may be. According to Burnough, the museum's purpose is to create an environment where families and individuals can display their family heirlooms and tell their personal stories.

"There is something about bringing your family together where stories are told. It helps you understand who you are," Burnough said. "I want it to be a place where people talk and reminisce. I don't want a stoic place. I want a magical place, a happy place."

Burnough is putting her entire doll collection on display, including the Princess Tiana and Prince Naveen dolls from the 2009 Disney film *The Princess and the Frog.* These dolls are symbolic of the entire museum. According to a Disney website on the princess, "Tiana knew that a dream is a little bit of magic and a lot of hard work."

The African-American dolls are just a part of the proposed museum, which at this writing was still looking for a permanent location, preferably a house rather than an industrial place, said Burnough. The other part of the museum is to honor African-Americans in Clayton County who were the firsts in their field.

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The museum will pay tribute to elected officials, such as Congressman David Scott and Congresswoman Nikema Williams, County Commission Eldrin Bell, Police Chief Jeffrey Turner, Clayton police officers Sharkley Buford and Dana Scott, District Attorney Jewel Scott, and others who created the career path for others to follow.

Burnough has not forgotten the officials in the county's seven cities. She plans to have exhibits with African-American firsts in city government, including College Park Mayor Bianca Motley Broom, Riverdale Mayor Phaedra Graham, and Forest Park Mayor Angeline Butler. Several council members, police and fire chiefs, and police officers will be memorialized as well.

Not all the officials will come from the ranks of elected politicians. Prominent African-Americans not elected consist of Chamber of Commerce Board Chair Pastor Wesley Greene and CEO Yulonda Dardin Beauford, head of the water authority Bernard Franks, library director Rosiland Lett, among others.

The museum will observe the tremendous changes in the Clayton County School system, beginning with the William Alfred Fountain school created in 1952 as part of the Rosenwald Schools. This series of schools was conceived by Booker T. Washington of the Tuskegee Institute and Julius Rosenwald, the Jewish philanthropist and president of Sears Roebuck, to build state-of-the art schools for African-American children across the South. Some historians call this effort the most important initiative to advance black education in the segregated America of the early 20th century.

The story of the Rosenwald schools can be found in a book Burnough wants to include in the museum's research material. *A Better Life for Their Children* by Andrew Feiler details the tremendous influence that students from these schools have had on this country. Many took the lessons learned at a Rosenwald school to become leaders of civil rights movement.

In Clayton County today there are nine schools named after African-Americans who greatly influenced the direction of the county's educational system. One of these is named for a man with more than half a century of service to Clayton schools: Eddie White.

White was twice recognized as the Star Teacher at the high school and would twice be named Clayton County Teacher of the Year in 1972 and 1977, one of only two teachers to be so honored. His picture is the first in line at the teacher Hall


of Fame display at the Clayton County School Administrative office in Jonesboro. And in 2010, the Eddie J. White Middle School Academy was established to honor the long-time teacher and administrator.

"Never in my wildest dreams would I think that a school would be named after me," White told this publication a few years ago. "I'm very thankful and very honored. I feel I'm somewhat ministerial, which is what I set out to do, because kids and teachers came to me for advice. The bottom line is, I've done what I wanted to do originally."

From the whimsy of dolls to the seriousness of politics, the M&R Museum will span the African-American experience on a purely local level. Burnough wants visitors to both learn and be enchanted.

"The museum is something that is evolving. It may not be perfect but it is a start," Burnough said. "I want that warmth and excitement I saw in McKenzie's eyes. I want to share that with others."



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
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

social media, the phenomenon of going viral has given birth to numerous internet sensations. One such sensation is the enigmatic skater known as "Push." With his mesmerizing roller-skating moves and charismatic presence, Push has captured the hearts of millions worldwide. However, beyond the glitz and glamour of internet fame lies a story of passion, family, and an unexpected profession that has shaped the life of this Atlanta native.

The journey of Push began around three to four years ago when a video of him roller-skating effortlessly at Cascade Skate Rink in Atlanta exploded on Twitter. Within a couple of hours, the video amassed a staggering 2 million views, and in just a few weeks, it skyrocketed to 29 million. The video featured a group of women from Memphis,

cousins and best friends, who happened to record Push's performance, unknowingly igniting his path to internet standom

Born and raised in Atlanta, Push, whose real name is Kyle Dutcher, had been skating since childhood. It all started during his summer daycare days when he would visit the skating rink for field trips. However, it wasn't until he faced a personal struggle, divorce, and the responsibility of being a single father to his young daughter that he rediscovered his passion for skating. With a newfound determination, Push delved into the world of adult skating, immersing himself in the diverse styles that Atlanta's melting pot offered. "At first all I did was watch other people skate and then the last 30 to 40 minutes of the night, I'd skate." He reflects.

Push considers his style a culmination of these influences, making Atlanta a

Despite being one of the few white skaters in the predominantly African-American skating community, Push faced few issues. The skating culture embraced everyone who shared a passion for the art, creating a close-knit family where people supported and encouraged each other. Push cherishes the camaraderie and refers to his fellow skaters as his "skate fam." "I Love running into my skating family. We see each other in the store or at a light and scream, "Yell, hey skate fam". It is this sense of community that strengthens his bond with skating and inspires him to keep pushing new boundaries.

However, beyond the glimmering lights of skating stardom, Push (Kyle) has another surprising passion - tree-climbing which happens to be his '9-to-5' job. In an entirely different realm, Push works in the tree service industry. He co-owns SCS Tree Services based in Woodstock, GA. He has been a profession for 15 years. With expertise in diagnosing and cutting trees, he treats tree surgery as an art form, akin to Mr. Miyagi's meticulous pruning of bonsai trees in the movie Karate Kid

Tourette Syndrome and Push

Behind the dazzling moves and magnetic charm of Push lies a personal battle with severe anxiety caused by acute Tourette syndrome. Push's journey to success has not been without challenges, and his triumph over this condition is a testament to his resilience and determination.

Tourette syndrome is a neurological disorder characterized by involuntary movements and vocalizations called tics. These tics can be sudden, repetitive, and difficult to control, often causing significant distress and discomfort. Push was diagnosed with the condition at the tender age of 14, which added an extra layer of complexity to his life.

Even amid the spotlight of his rising internet fame, Push faces the constant struggle of managing his anxiety. His Tourette can cause tics to worsen, especially during moments of nervousness or heightened stress. He shared an incident on his way to an interview where his nerves kicked in, triggering a series of tics, some of which affected his breathing. "Today on the way over here, I felt my anxiety and breathing get short. I am good now but I did feel the tics". It is a reminder that behind the confident persona lies a person facing his own internal battles.

Push has encountered others with more severe cases of Tourette, including the wife of one of his employees. This firsthand experience with different levels of the condition allows him to empathize with those who share similar struggles. It is this empathy that strengthens his connection with others, both on and off the skating rink.

He likens Tourette to having an itch that cannot be satisfied with a scratch. It's an apt analogy that captures the relentless nature of the condition, its unpredictability, and its ability to influence various aspects of his life. Despite this constant challenge, Push's commitment to his passions, including skating and tree-climbing, remains unwavering.

Push's story is a reminder that each individual carries their unique battles, and it is through perseverance, empathy, and passion that we can rise above adversities.

Push's profound connection with nature and the earth has instilled in him a belief in grounding oneself by walking barefoot outside. This outdoorsman's approach to life guides him not only in his tree-climbing endeavors but also in his skating. Both activities require a deep understanding of one's surroundings and the ability to harmonize with nature's rhythm.





Infected By the Production Bug



Being a production assistant affords the opportunity to actually decide what you want to be in the industry because you get to see everyone else's role, whether it is director, writer or actor. From her humble beginnings, she worked her way up from a production assistant to assume leadership roles in the industry.

After 14 years at TPS, and serving as President of Production in her final four years, Sneed accumulated the necessary expertise to embark on her own production company. Embracing her outlier status, she recognizes that it affords her the best of all worlds, combining diverse experiences and perspectives.

Reaching New Heights: A Few Good Women Productions

With the success of Tyler Perry Studios (TPS) and her role in its creation and development, Michelle Sneed found herself contemplating how she could expand opportunities for others aspiring to pursue diverse careers in the film industry. Raising capital for her production company, A Few Good Women Productions, Sneed candidly acknowledges the awareness of her identity as a woman and, more specifically, as a Black woman. The perception of her being a woman and a woman of color influences how others view her efforts to raise substantial funds, even to the extent of daring to raise \$100 million. While she recognizes the support she has received, she also acknowledges the unique challenges she faces due to societal biases and stereotypes. "I have have never been so aware that I am a woman and a black woman on top of that".

She strives to challenge the notion that women of color primarily serve as talent rather than creators and decision-makers. The uniqueness of her company's mission and objectives sets it apart, making it a pioneering endeavor that even industry powerhouses like Oprah and Shonda Rhimes have yet to undertake.

As Sneed forges ahead in her journey, she remains undeterred by the obstacles she encounters. A Few Good Women Productions represents a groundbreaking venture that aims to shatter barriers, elevate underrepresented voices, and reshape the industry's perception of women of color. 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Ingredients:

For the Crust:

- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup unsalted butter, cold and cut into small cubes
- 1/4 to 1/2 cup ice water

For the Filling:

- 6 cups fresh peaches, peeled, pitted, and sliced
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon - 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter, cut into small pieces

For Assembly:

- 1 egg, beaten (for egg wash)
- 1 tablespoon granulated sugar (for sprinkling)

Instructions:

1. Preparing the Crust:

- In a large mixing bowl, whisk together the flour, sugar, and salt. Add the cold cubed butter and use a pastry cutter or your fingertips to cut the butter into the flour mixture until it resembles coarse crumbs.
- Gradually add the ice water, a tablespoon at a time, and mix with a fork until the dough comes together. Be careful not to overwork the dough. Divide it into two equal parts, form each into a disc, wrap in plastic wrap, and refrigerate for at least 30 minutes.

2. Preparing the Filling:

- In a large bowl, combine the sliced peaches, sugar, flour, cornstarch, lemon juice, cinnamon, and salt. Toss gently until the peaches are coated evenly. Let the mixture sit for about 10 minutes to allow the flavors to meld together.

3. Preparing the Pie:

- Roll out the second disc of dough and cover the pie. You can either place the whole sheet on top, cut slits for venting, and crimp the edges, or create a lattice pattern with strips of dough. Trim any excess dough and crimp the edges to seal.



- If the edges of the crust start to darken too quickly, cover them with foil or a pie crust shield to prevent burning.
- Once baked, remove the pie from the oven and let it cool on a wire rack for at least 2 hours to allow the filling to set before serving.

5. Serving the Pie:

- Slice the peach pie into wedges and serve it as is or with a scoop of vanilla ice cream or whipped cream for an extra indulgence.
- Leftover pie can be stored at room temperature for up to 2 days or refrigerated for up to 4 days.

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

Along the route, you'll also come across several campsites, offering opportunities for rest and relaxation.

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

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
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








Art of Living

Art for Everyone

Atlanta's High Museum has moved from exclusivity to inclusivity under Director Randall Suffolk

even years ago, Randall Suffolk came to Atlanta's High Museum of Art with the goal of opening the museum's doors to the city's expanding and diverse population. Alongside the "old friends," as he calls the pieces that have long been on display, he revitalized the museum with new art installations, new artists, and new visions that reflected the city's inhabitants.

"We want every walk of life, every color of the rainbow, coming to experience their museum," he said recently in a room just off the museum's courtyard where artisans and workers were constructing a sphere for the Joylanta exhibition. "Art encourages people to think critically about oneself and about the world around them. At the end of the day, they are

all things that are going to make us better citizens and, hopefully, to strengthen society at large."

The High's visitor profiles have drastically changed in the past seven years. Prior to 2015 the non-white visitors accounted for just fifteen percent of the total. Last year that figured topped fifty-seven percent. At the same time, exhibitions featuring women artists, artists of color and LGBTQ+ artists rose to over fifty percent of the total presentations.

"We've doubled down to engage the next two generations," Suffolk said. "We've had great success in changing our end users, for lack of a better word."

Figures put out by the High show that nearly seven out of ten visitors are under the age of 55 and an astonishing fifty-five percent are under the age of 35. Memberships in the museum have increased by twenty-seven percent, even with the pandemic, to 33,000 households.

Suffolk immediately reduced the admission price to an affordable \$18.50 and implemented the Second Sunday program, which provides free admission all day. Before the advent of this popular program, High visitors numbered an average of 1,650 on Sundays. Second Sunday now averages around 4,300 visitors.

And that doesn't count the 50,000 school kids that come on tours with their schools.

Many schools in the Southern Crescent take advantage of the High's Art Access program that pays for all the kids' and teachers' admission, and even kicks in for transportation costs.

Flashay Benford is a Media Specialist at Stockbridge High School who took her art studies students on a visit to the High during Black History Month.

"Some of the students had never left Henry County. So, this was an opportunity for them to have a cultural experience. They could learn about the world outside their world," she said. "We went specifically for Black History Month so our students could see some of the black artists on display."

Latiefa Hairston echoed the same experience for her eight grade students from ASAP Gender Academy at Bear Creek Elementary School.

"It exposed them to artists who look like people they ride MARTA with," she said. Her students were fascinated by El Anatsui, a Ghana artist who creates objects with things such as aluminum cans and pull tabs.

Another artist that grabbed her kids' attention was Vik Muniz, a Brazilian artist who produced images of the Mona Lisa in peanut butter and jelly. "They were fascinated by some of the art, especially the Brazilian artist. One student told me he didn't know there were black people in Brazil," said Hairston.


"We think it is really important to give these children an opportunity to come into contact with not only experiences but conversations that are bigger than themselves," said Suffolk.

"I teach the classics, but I want

the kids to see modern artists. These are artists the kids can relate to," said Elise Gomez, the k-5 Visual Arts Lead at Arnold Elementary School.

Some of her students came up and hugged Gomez as they were heading home. "They said, 'Thank you for bringing us!' It was one of those feel-good moments that makes being a teacher worth it."

But art for art's sake is not the only driving force for teachers to expose their students to the High.

"Art teaches a lot of skills that can be applied to many areas of life. It teaches patience and perseverance. It helps them to look at the world around them," said Ayaana Thompson, the 5th grade teacher at Lake Ridge Elementary School. "It is one thing to show them art in the classroom but when they leave the four walls of the school and see art in the museum, it is an entirely different experience."

"Art builds a foundation for creative thinking. Jobs are asking for people who think outside the box, and having art in elementary school helps with this thinking," said Gomez.

Art classes are one of the first victims of budget cuts, said Suffolk, who noted that the students host all kinds of kids, toddlers to seniors in high school. "Art is being more and more lost," noted Hairston. "Often, they see no purpose in it."

The new artists and exhibitions have changed the perception of the High as it has changed the audience of the museum. Where once it was thought that only the wealthy elite or highly educated people went to the High, recent studies reveal a dramatic shift in visitors. Today, some forty-four percent have less than a bachelor's degree and about forty-two percent make less than \$70,000 a year.

"People really drive these institutions. Without people, these are just fancy storage units with a retail component," said Suffolk. "That is not what we want to be. That is not our mission."

The mission of the High will continue to showcase new visions from emerging artists that will spark different conversations about who and what we are as a civilization. One recent exhibition was from Deana Lawson, whose photographs "challenges the conventional representations of Black identities and bodies," according to the High's description of her work.

Proving that a great artist does not have to go to art school or study the classical artists, George Voronovsky is a Ukranian refugee who settled in Florida, where he taught himself to make paintings executed on cardboard and figures in Styrofoam. He even made a film of constructing a rocket ship to the sun. The High displayed many of his works four decades after his death.

Suffolk said the museum strives to show a wide variety of art. The High is the first museum in the Southeast to offer "one of the most important collections of samurai armor outside of Japan." Running through September, the exhibit features more than one hundred fifty helmets, swords, and other objects, including complete sets of armor, that span almost nine centuries.

The generations to come in Atlanta will naturally influence the conversations art generates and contribute to the innovative looks and artists that mirror the community at large.

"We believe there is something ultimately very powerful and super generative about being a place where the richest of the rich can come together with the poorest of the poor, where every color and range of the LGBTQ+ rainbow can come together with every color of the ethnicity rainbow," said Suffolk. "We want the High to be a place where all of Atlanta can come
